Please find in the report that follows class size data for Needham High School for the SY 2015-2016. Data have been gathered based on the October 1, 2015 figures. There have been some student course enrollment changes since that time, albeit few, that are not reflected in this document. You will also find matrices that provide the current number of students per section as well as the total teacher courseload for this year. After completing this document, it is evident to me that our teachers are well supported and our students well served.

Average Teacher Load

Tables 1 and 2 provide statistics related to staffing allocations in each department. These data reflect mean student to teacher ratios within each department that are then compared to a target load set by department chairs, program directors, and the principal during the spring of the previous school year. The staffing formula is designed to attain average student-teacher ratios within five students of the aforementioned targets. This methodology is not used, however when calculating ratios within the Music and Theater Programs, as the nature of performing arts and ensemble programs do not lend themselves to standard class size formulas.

Table 2 presents the aggregrate data compared with SY 2009 through 2016. Teacher load has changed during this 8 year period. Due to the addition of 3.3 FTE in the SY 2015 and 1.1 for the current school year, teacher load has decreased slightly in most academic areas. These FTE increases over the past 2 years have allowed NHS to maintain its offerings in all academic areas as well as expanding student choices in Fine and Performing Arts. The most notable expansion in the academic area has been the Greater Boston Project. This interdisciplinary course has been widely praised and its popularity has resulted in an additional section created this year. The administration and staff feel very fortunate to be able to continue to offer students these outstanding learning opportiunities.

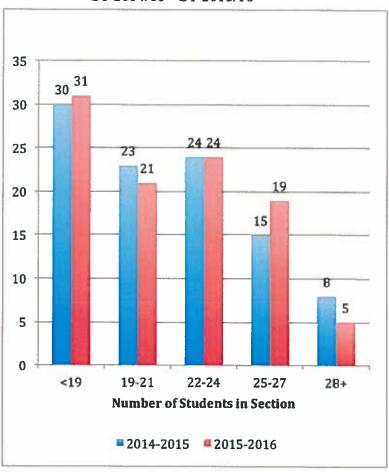
Table 3 reflects the range of enrollment within course sections across academic areas. This year's ranges reflect a small decrease from the overall number of classes with 28+ students. This decrease has resulted in an increase in the number of classes with 25-27 students enrolled. The added 1.1 teacher FTE has allowed course offerings to remain intact and teacher load to remain steady and even decrease slightly in some areas.

Impact Statement

While program offerings and staffing rates have increased since 2012, class size, in upper level courses and in Physical Education, remain high. Consistent funding particularly and staffing increases have allowed NHS to expand the instructional program, and largely to maintain the level of service and class size to provide for manageable teacher loads. Student enrollment will continue to increase in the coming years with a projected peak of 1,800 students within 5 years. Continued increases in staffing will be needed to maintain manageable class sizes and to maintain program offerings. Though staffing levels may increase to accommodate enrollment, the need for additional instructional space is critical as the 2009 renovations and addition to NHS were designed to serve only 1,450 students. In addition to converting non instructional space to classrooms and dividing larger classrooms to multiple spaces, it is estimated that NHS will need up to eight additional classroom spaces, as well as additional activity space for physical education, to accommodate this enrollment increase.

Hillside School Feasibility Study

Heidi Black, Susan Neckes (School Committee), Don Walter and Jason Boone (Dore & Whittier) attended the meeting.

Mr. Haff reported that the Preferred Schematic Report (PSR) process has started. The PDP submission is still being reviewed by the MSBA.

Mr. Walter indicated that six options were submitted to the MSBA on September 2nd and the Committee has to move to one preferred option by December. A preferred option is expected to be chosen by October 6th with a public presentation being scheduled on September 28th. The PSR is anticipated to be delivered to the MSBA by December 1, 2015. He reviewed the various site options for the Committee.

The MSBA approved enrollment is 430 students even though today's Hillside enrollment is 467 students at the beginning of this school year. The current program allows for this flexibility because the new school program is based upon the lower end of NPS class size.

Of the three landowners of the parcels needed for Option

C3, a new building at Hillside, only two are willing to sell their parcels at this time. All three parcels would be needed to go forward with this option. Negotiations on the Central Avenue parcels are positive and ongoing. There have been positive discussions with the Wellesley Town Manager regarding using some of Wellesley's land for green play space.

The current cost estimates range from the low of Option A (Capital Improvement Plan only), cost of \$13,086,000 to a high of \$91,227,000 for Option B1 (Addition & Renovation at Hillside Elementary School site, which include the building of temporary swing space at DeFazio). The MSBA would not reimburse any portion of modular classroom use.

Site mitigation costs are included in all of the Hillside estimates. An under-slab depressurization system would have to be installed in Option C3. MDL continues to treat the soil at their site and at the school.

The DeFazio baseball field nearest the proposed school or swing space site used for construction staging would be out of commission for three years, from the start of the project construction to the recovery of the field.

The traffic study on Central Ave is in process. Some information should be available next week. Traffic counts are being taken on West Street and Central Ave. Attendees expressed a concern of adding a third school on Central Ave and its impact on the early morning traffic.

Redistricting studies have been conducted for each of the options. Options that include Hillside (Option C3) and Central Avenue (Option J3) would not need redistricting. Major redistricting is required for a DeFazio (Option E1a) or DeFazio & High Rock (Option E2a + H3).

Ms. Black made a motion to remove Options A (Hillside CIP only) and B1 (Hillside addition/renovation with swing space) from future consideration at this time as they do no provide value to the Town and do not meet the educational requirements. Mr. Greis seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously, by both committees.

Various concerns were expressed by the audience. Some of the questions were; what would become of the Hillside School, disruption on Sunset Road, the length of the construction period, what costs would be reimbursed by the MSBA, what the project contingency would be, would traffic lights be required at Central Ave site, time constraints regarding the moving of current tenants of the Central Ave property.

A second preferred alternative may have to be noted in the PSR.

The Permanent Public Building Committee adjourned the Adjournment joint meeting with the School Committee at 9:40 p.m.

School Committee PPBC Chair's Welcome and Overview

Dr. Barr opened the meeting and stated that the School Committee is pleased to be at this point in the process of providing an excellent school for the Hillside community. Dr. Barr stated that the School Committee and the PPBC met last week and have voted to eliminate two options.

Mr. Kent stated that two options have been eliminated. The PPBC and the School Committee are looking at the four options that remain and are asking, which of those four options are preferred. Mr. Kent also stated that the committees will not vote on this tonight as a joint committee but would like the community's input.

Dr. Barr outlined the agenda and thanked everyone who has been involved with this process.

Designer Presentation on Hillside Options

The presentation from Dore & Whittier Architecture Project Hillside Options Management, Don Walters, Principal, and Michele Rogers, Project Manager, included a review of the Hillside Elementary School Feasibility Study (a K-5 program for a 430 student school), alternatives chosen for additional consideration, and community impact. Jason Boone, also from Dore & Whittier, would facilitate the small group discussions.

Mr. Walter stated that a Preliminary Design Program (PDP) was submitted to the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) on September 3, 2015. The PDP includes six options, two of which were eliminated at the joint PPBC and School Committee meeting on September 21, 2015(Option A: Capital Improvements Only and Option B1: Addition and Renovation). The four remaining Options include, Option C: New School on Hillside Site, Option E1: New Elementary School on East DeFazio, Option E2: New Grade 6 School on East DeFazio and Option J: K-5 School at Owen's Poultry Farm site located on Central Avenue. Further development on the options will continue leading to the submission of a Preferred Schematic Report (PSR) to the MSBA on December 3, 2015. Mr. Walters described the evaluation criteria for the four remaining options, which include

Educational Programming-30%, Project Cost-30%, Site Location-20%, Site Amenities-10% and Site Circulation-10%. Mr. Walters presented a schematic overview on each option.

Moe Handel, Chairman, Needham Board of Selectmen, spoke about acquiring the Owen's Poultry Farm Land. Mr. Handel stated that last spring Owen's Poultry Farm approached the Needham Board of Selectmen, through the Town Manager, on a discussion regarding the sale of their farm including some of the associated property they own adjacent to the farm. Mr. Handel stated that he believes a purchase and sale agreement will be imminent and that an offer that is acceptable to the town would be pursued through Town Meeting and an override to gain the means to fund the purchase.

Ms. Rogers presented an analysis on what potential redistricting would look like. Ms. Rogers used the current districting map to point out areas that would potentially change. Ms. Rogers pointed out that the Central Avenue site would present very little to no change in redistricting. The DeFazio site or High Rock School site would present no changes to the Eliot School as well as the Broadmeadow School areas. The biggest change would be in the Newman School area where Newman would take over much of the Hillside School site and either the DeFazio East or the K-5 School at High Rock. Ms. Rogers presented data on the percentage of students able to walk to school within three quarters of a mile including the proposed sites. The walk to school information is based on the 2014-2015 enrollment data.

Mr. Walters presented an overview on the estimated project cost for each of the four options. In all cases the cost to purchase any land was not included in the estimated project cost.

Public Comments and Feedback

Public Comments and Feedback

Dr. Barr opened this portion of the meeting to public comment.

Louise Miller, Chair of the Finance Committee. Ms. Miller stated the Finance Committee would be reviewing the financial implications of the purchase of property as well as the various options that are being presented. The Finance Committee will meet on October 21, 2015 with the PPBC and the School Committee. The Finance Committee will also be discussing the purchase of property on October 27, 2015. A review and recommendation from the Finance Committee will be presented to the Special Town Meeting on November 2, 2015. Ms. Miller stated that the Finance Committee looks forward to working with all the Boards.

Erik Bailey, Town Meeting Member. Mr. Bailey stated that he is pleased to see progress on the Central Ave site. However, he is a proponent of building at the Hillside site with swing space at DeFazio and looking ahead to the Mitchell construction project, he believes that DeFazio swing space could be used for that construction project. Mr. Kent commented that Hillside could be used as a swing site for the Mitchell School, which might alleviate the necessity for having swing space at the DeFazio Site.

Leo R., West Street. The gentleman expressed his appreciation for the amount of work that has gone into this process. He asked if a consideration is being made for proximity to public transportation, which would be helpful for parents.

Andrew Newman, parent of two, whose children attended the Hillside School. Mr. Newman expressed that Central Avenue is overburdened by traffic. He would like to see a discussion and analysis regarding this.

Elizabeth Bloom, Town Meeting Member. Ms. Bloom stated that

residents of Needham were promised information on how much it would cost to build a school on Cricket Field and that they have never received that information.

Josh M., 553 Central Ave. The gentleman stated that after living at his residence for 10 years, he now has to pay for flood insurance. He also stated that it is not a good idea to purchase land for the construction of a school in a flood zone.

Betsy R., resident of the Newman School area. She stated that both the Hillside and Central Avenue options keep continuity of district although one is \$21M less and doesn't require modular classrooms. She also stated that traffic studies are important. She is not opposed to redistricting but supportive of an option that provides a smart long-term solution.

Gerry Rovner, Town Meeting Member. Mr. Rovner stated that he would like to know where the population numbers from the school came from.

Sunset Road resident. The gentleman stated that Hillside is a better option than the Central Avenue option, which presents limited green space, traffic and noise.

Joe Lipchitz, Sunset Road. Mr. Lipchitz stated that all of the elementary schools are not on primary roads. Mr. Lipchitz expressed concerns for safety regarding the Central Avenue option and would like to see a traffic study on the Central Avenue option.

Holly Clark, Town Meeting Member. Ms. Clark stated that a traffic study should be completed and submitted for public record for the Central Avenue option.

John Shapiro, Hillside School area. Mr. Shapiro stated that he participated in a small group presentation last Monday night and he appreciated the Q&A. Mr. Shapiro asked for clarification on the sale of the three parcels of land for sale relative to the Hillside site. Mr. Shapiro also asked for a traffic study of the Central Avenue site particularly for events before and after school.

Ken Winston, Cynthia Road. Mr. Winston expressed the need for a lot of space large enough for children to play in, space, which is critical to the development of young children. Mr. Winston also expressed a concern for the traffic on Central Avenue and the need to improve safety for the area.

Anthony S., Central Avenue. The gentleman stated that he has lived on Central Avenue for 88 years and has seen the roadway go from a dirt road to a super highway. He opposes the construction of a new school at the Owen's Farm property.

Amy Rubin, Cynthia Road. Ms. Rubin stated that children are able to ride their bikes to school without ever crossing a main road. Ms. Rubin also expressed concerns for children crossing a main roadway that is already occupied by three elementary schools.

Bob Larson, Town Meeting Member. Mr. Larson stated that the timeline for completion is not realistic.

The next portion of the meeting commenced with a small group activity. The purpose of the activity is to hear from the community on what the most pressing issues and concerns might be. This information would help shape the evaluation matrix.

Superintendent Gutekanst stated the opening of schools went well enrollment is a little over 5600 students. Students are working hard and doing great things already with their teachers.

Superintendent Gutekanst reminded parents to access their Powerschool account and update their demographic information and make appropriate changes, as well as sign the Students Responsible Use of Digital Resource Policy. Superintendent Gutekanst stated that it is extremely important to have current information on students should their school need to contact parents in an emergency. Superintendent Gutekanst stated the Students Responsible Use of Digital Resource Policy is important to students for their online safety, security and privacy. Superintendent Gutekanst strongly encouraged parents to take care of these two items. Parents should contact their school's office for assistance if they have any problems accessing their account.

DICUSSION ITEMS

Needham High School Student Advisory to School Committee Report

Dr. Gutekanst welcomed the Student Advisory to School Committee (SASC). Dr. Gutekanst stated the SASC meets regularly with the principal to discuss school issues, concerns, and ideas with the high school administration. This is the first report the SASC will provide the School Committee this year. The students are excited and prepared to discuss their issues with the School Committee and welcome School Committee questions and comments. Dr. Gutekanst welcomed Zachary Dore, Caroline Kapp, Jackson Megar, Sonia Raja, and Grace Ward.

Students expressed their appreciation to the School Committee for an opportunity to present the current events of Needham High School. Student spoke about changes in the configuration of Student Council At-Large, which include two temporary committees: School Culture and School Spirit. School Culture Committee is a working group designed to make more students aware of the many different cultures at NHS. School Spirit Committee is a working group designed to increase spirit and enthusiasm at NHS focusing on the week leading up to Pep Rally and the Thanksgiving break.

Students reported on space at NHS, which continues to be an issue. Students noted the current freshman class has 457 students while the senior class who graduated last year only had 387 students. Students reported on high school administration compensating for the lack of space, which includes converting supply closets into classroom space. Students also reported on overcrowded conditions in the cafeteria as well as crowded hallways, which make it very difficult to move around. Students reported that the crowded conditions at NHS have come to a point where it interferes with the learning of students and ability for teachers to teach at their highest level.

Dr. Gutekanst stated that the Thanksgiving Football game Needham vs. Wellesley, this year would be at Fenway Park. More to come. Dr. Gutekanst stated that in terms of space at NHS, it would be a good idea for Student Council to invite Town Meeting members to lunch at the high school to share with them some of the issues of space. Dr. Gutekanst thanked the students for their leadership and in bringing the issues of NHS to the School Committee.

Needham High School Student Advisory to School Committee Report

2015 Performance Report Highlights

Dr. Gutekanst introduced this item. Dr. Gutekanst stated the 2015 Performance Reports were mailed to all Needham households. The report details school and student performance as well as challenges facing the school system. Dr. Gutekanst stated that over the last several months, Diane Simmons has gathered data and information; has used District Goals, gathered evidence, and interviewed many people all in an attempt to tell the story of the Needham Public Schools in a compelling and useful way. Dr. Gutekanst stated that he welcomes School Committee's comments. Dr. Gutekanst welcomed Ms. Diane Simmons, Director of Communication, Planning and Community Education.

Ms. Simmons stated the 2015 Performance Report is a reflection of the expertise of the staff and also the contributions from volunteers, as well as information that was generated over the course of the school year.

Ms. Simmons stated that it is her hope that the Performance Report addresses the parent and community interest and concerns of the Needham Public Schools as well as generate pride, trust, and transparency. Ms. Simmons outlined feedback and alignment of District Goals as well as accomplishments from last year. Ms. Simmons summarized challenges and opportunities.

The Top Ten Highlights of the Performance Report include: #1 New elementary Spanish, Wellness and STEAM programs as well as the new interdisciplinary courses at the high school including the Greater Boston Project and Robotics/Arts. #2 Common assessments at every level to ensure each child has foundational experiences and skills in grades K-12 as well as assessment of the impact of community service learning on student growth. #3 Level One Status for four of our schools based on improved MCAS scores. #4 Development of culturally proficient practices as well as expansion of our exchange program with Beijing's Daxing School District. #5 Da Vinci Workshop at NHS and elementary family STEAM fair with over 800 attendees. #6 Enhancements to school safety protocols and pilot ALICE. #7 1 to 1 Personalized Learning initiative for the middle school. #8 Development of a pathway to implementing Full-Day Kindergarten. #9 Feasibility studies to replace Hillside Elementary School and expand high school space. #10 MIAA Sportsmanship Award in Skiing and Boys Volleyball as well as state champions in Boys Soccer, Girls Cross Country and Boys Volleyball.

Dr. Gutekanst noted that the 2017-2021 CIP is representative of a lot of significant work from Anne Gulati, Director of Financial Operations in consultation with school principals and directors as well as David Davidson, Needham Director of Finance. Dr. Gutekanst stated he is also proposing the continued implementation of capital cost to be included in the operating budget. A. <u>Approval of Minutes</u>

The Committee was sent the minutes from the August 24th and September 8th PPBC meetings. Mr. Kent made a motion that the Committee approve the minutes of these two meetings. Mr. Schneider seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously.

B. <u>High School Cafeteria Expansion</u>

Heidi Black (School Committee), Aaron Sicotte (H.S. Assist. Principal) and Cal Olson (DRA) attended the meeting.

Mr. Taliep reported on the progress of the project. The 90% Construction Documents have been sent to Daedalus and DRA's cost estimator CostPro. Estimates should be available by October 5th at which time they will be reconciled and a report sent to the Committee by October 16th for discussion at the October 19 PPBC meeting. It was

requested that the reconciled cost estimate be sent out as soon as possible to allow more informed discussions before the Special Town Meeting in November. The reconciled estimates will be the basis of the information presented to Town Meeting for construction funding.

The exterior plans were reviewed. A change in the plan deleting some of the paving and seating will reduce the costs. The technology consultant reduced the estimated costs from \$250,000 to \$150,000. The number of projectors, screens and monitors has been reduced; and is being reviewed in greater detail.

The General Contractor pre-qualification process is underway. Six companies sent in their qualifications on July 29th. They were Colantonio, Inc., GTC Construction, Maron Construction, Northern Contracting, O'Connor Construction and Paul J. Rogan, Inc. References are being checked. It is expected that three to five companies will be pre-qualified.

DRA will be presenting another PSS for additional services which include a technology consultant.

C. <u>Hillside School Feasibility Study</u>

Heidi Black, Susan Neckes (School Committee), Don Walter and Jason Boone (Dore & Whittier) attended the meeting.

Mr. Haff reported that the Preferred Schematic Report (PSR) process has started. The PDP submission is still being reviewed by the MSBA.

Mr. Walter indicated that six options were submitted to the MSBA on September 2nd and the Committee has to move to one preferred option by December. A preferred option is expected to be chosen by October 6th with a public presentation being scheduled on September 28th. The PSR is anticipated to be delivered to the MSBA by December 1, 2015. He reviewed the various site options for the Committee.

The MSBA approved enrollment is 430 students even though today's Hillside enrollment is 467 students at the beginning of this school year. The current program allows for this flexibility because the new school program is based upon the lower end of NPS class size.

Of the three landowners of the parcels needed for Option C3, a new building at Hillside, only two are willing to sell their parcels at this time. All three parcels would be needed to go forward with this option. Negotiations on the Central Avenue parcels are positive and ongoing. There have been positive discussions with the Wellesley Town Manager regarding using some of Wellesley's land for green play space.

The current cost estimates range from the low of Option A (Capital Improvement Plan only), cost of \$13,086,000 to a high of \$91,227,000 for Option B1 (Addition & Renovation at Hillside Elementary School site, which include the building of temporary

swing space at DeFazio). The MSBA would not reimburse any portion of modular classroom use.

Site mitigation costs are included in all of the Hillside estimates. An under-slab depressurization system would have to be installed in Option C3. MDL continues to treat the soil at their site and at the school.

The DeFazio baseball field nearest the proposed school or swing space site used for construction staging would be out of commission for three years, from the start of the project construction to the recovery of the field.

The traffic study on Central Ave is in process. Some information should be available next week. Traffic counts are being taken on West Street and Central Ave. Attenddees expressed a concern of adding a third school on Central Ave and its impact on the early morning traffic.

Redistricting studies have been conducted for each of the options. Options that include Hillside (Option C3) and Central Avenue (Option J3) would not need redistricting. Major redistricting is required for a DeFazio (Option E1a) or DeFazio & High Rock (Option E2a + H3).

Ms. Black made a motion to remove Options A (Hillside CIP only) and B1 (Hillside addition/renovation with swing space) from future consideration at this time as they do no provide value to the Town and do not meet the educational requirements. Mr. Greis seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously, by both committees.

Various concerns were expressed by the audience. Some of the questions were; what would become of the Hillside School, disruption on Sunset Road, the length of the construction period, what costs would be reimbursed by the MSBA, what the project contingency would be, would traffic lights be required at Central Ave site, time constraints regarding the moving of current tenants of the Central Ave property.

A second preferred alternative may have to be noted in the PSR.

A. <u>Hillside School Feasibility Study</u>

Heidi Black, Susan Neckes (School Committee), Don Walter, Michele Rogers, Jason Boone and Emily Roy (Dore & Whittier) attended the meeting. Many residents also attended the meeting. (Sign-in sheets attached to minutes)

Dore & Whittier reviewed the current status of the project. The MSBA Feasibility Study process was reviewed. The Preferred Schematic Report Phase of the Feasibility Study will be finished at the end of 2015 when a preferred option will be presented to the MSBA. The Preliminary Design Program (PDP) Report which included an Educational Program and Space Summary, Site Assessment and Preliminary Evaluation of Alternatives was submitted to the MSBA on September 1st. It is still under review.

There are currently four options being considered for the Preferred Schematic Report. The options are Option C3 (New School at Hillside dependent on purchase of three land parcels and swing space at DeFazio), Option E1A (K-5 School at DeFazio), Option E2A (6th Grade School at DeFazio and renovated High Rock K-5 School) and Option J3A (New School on Central Avenue dependent on land purchase).

The land purchase of the three Hillside parcels has run into difficulties as one of the landowners is unwilling to sell at this time. The Central Avenue land negotiations are proceeding positively.

Redistricting studies have been conducted for each of the options. Options that include Hillside (Option C3) and Central Avenue (Option J3) would not need redistricting. Major redistricting is required for a DeFazio (Option E1A) or DeFazio & High Rock (Option E2A + H3).

The Preferred Site is scheduled to be presented to the Board of Selectmen on October 13 for a vote. The Preferred Schematic Report (PSR) is scheduled to be submitted for approval at the November 16th PPBC meeting and submitted to the MSBA on December 1st.

The PSR will include a final evaluation of the remaining Alternatives and selection of a Preferred Option and further updates to the site plan building plans and systems. This would then be reviewed through a MSBA Facilities Assessment Sub-Committee process and submitted for approval at the January 2016 MSBA Board Meeting. Once approved by the MSBA the project would move into Schematic Design on the preferred option allowing for the initiation of a robust schematic design and development of a Project Budget. This would lead to a Project Scope and Budget Agreement to be approved at the MSBA Board meeting of July 2016. The next step includes a Town Vote in November 2016 Special Town Meeting and an override election, where project funding for the balance of design and construction will be sought.

The public was invited to express their opinions on the project. Ms. Louise Miller noted that the Finance Committee is scheduled to have meetings on October 7th and October 21st where the project will be discussed. Several concerns were expressed by the public including; lower percentage of walking population for the Central Ave and DeFazio school options, greater distance to public transportation at other sites, Central Avenue traffic congestion, Central Avenue site being near a flood zone, new school on Central Avenue could displace water towards houses, some feel the Hillside site is the place for the new school despite added costs, Central Avenue site does not have adequate green space, safety issues crossing Central Avenue, if Central Ave chosen there would be to many schools on Central Avenue, most kids will not be able to walk or bike to school, might loose feeling of Community, feel that the process is being rushed to deliver PSR to MSBA by December.

The presentation attendees were broken down into 4 groups and shown the Hillside site, the DeFazio site, the DeFazio/High Rock sites and the Central Ave site. Comments were recorded and answered. The slide presentation will be uploaded to the Needham Public School website.

A. <u>Hillside School Feasibility Study</u>

Heidi Black, Susan Neckes (School Committee), Don Walter, Michele Rogers (Dore & Whittier), Fayssal Husseini and Nick Havan (Nitsch Engineering) attended the meeting. The School Committee and several residents also attended the meeting.

Dr. Barr reported that many emails, expressing concern and opinions, were received by the School Committee after the Public Meeting held on September 28th and summarized the comments. The Hillside Feasibility study started with a review of twenty options which have been reduced to four options to date. The Central Avenue site became available in June 2015 when the current owner approached the Town to see if there was interest in acquiring the site. The site has since been thoroughly studied by the design team.

Dore & Whittier reviewed the current status of the project. There are currently four options being considered; the options are Option C3 (New School at Hillside dependant on purchase of three land parcels and swing space at DeFazio), Option E1A (K-5 School at DeFazio), Option E2A & H3 (6th Grade School at DeFazio and renovated High Rock as K-5 School) and Option J3A (New School on Central Avenue dependant on land purchase).

A draft forty page traffic study was received from Nitsch Engineering on October 5th. The results of the study were presented to the PPBC and School Committee. A draft copy of the report will be posted on the Town web site. Mr. Husseini and Mr. Havan from Nitsch reviewed the traffic study done at the Central Avenue and Hillside sites. Federal traffic guidelines were used to determine adequate sightlines for access and egress to the Central Avenue site. Existing conditions were studied at both Hillside School and the Central Avenue site. The conclusion is that the Central Avenue site is a viable site for a school from a traffic point of view. The main parking lot at Central Avenue has 100 parking spaces. Access to the site by car is proposed at the highest portion of the road. The sight lines at this entry/exit drive exceed AASHTO standards for stopping sight distance and intersection sight distance. The drive aisle queue can accommodate 57 cars at drop off and pick up, getting cars off of Central Avenue. It is possible to double the queue aisle in certain places in the parking lot allowing up to 76 vehicles waiting for pick-up.

25% of the school population would be able to walk to the Central Avenue site. 30% are able to walk to the Hillside School site. Five buses will be needed to drop students off in the proposed bus loop off Sunset Road, four Needham buses and one METCO bus. The supply receiving area would be near the cafeteria at the back of the school near the bus loop. Recommendations for the site would be have a left and right turn lane at the school exit. The Chief of Police requested that there be only one crosswalk at the Central Avenue site. The intersection does not warrant a new traffic light, but if requested the engineers could study the effect of adding a flashing light.

The Central Avenue site has more space for traffic to circulate within the site than the current Hillside School. Sheila Hemway indicated that Cefalo and Sunset roads are similar to the Broadmeadow School streets used for bus drop off and pick up. The roads only become a problem when cars or landscapers obstruct the streets during the start and end of the school day.

To be considered for Massachusetts School Building Authority funding, a preferred option needs to be submitted to them by December 1, 2015 to meet their timeline.

A purchase and sale agreement is expected to be signed this week. A ballpark figure is in the range of \$7 million, for acquisition and demolition expenses. Acquisition of all three properties at Hillside School is not possible at this time. This could delay an Option C3 Hillside at Hillside by at least one additional year.

Each of the School Committee members voiced their views on the four remaining options. It was determined that the two committees take independent votes on any motions. It was noted that Ms. Black and Ms. Neckes sit on both the School Committee and PPBC for this project.

Ms. Black made a motion for the School Committee to remove C3 (New School at Hillside dependant on purchase of three land parcels and swing space at DeFazio) and E2A & H3 (6th Grade School at DeFazio and renovated High Rock as K-5 School). Mr. Silverstein seconded the motion.

Ms. Nicols made a motion to the School Committee for an amendment to the previous motion, to split the two options independent of each other. Ms. Longo Carter seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon by the School Committee and approved unanimously. $\underline{7}$ in favor $\underline{0}$ against $\underline{0}$ abstentions

Ms. Black made a motion to the PPBC that the previous motion be split in two. Mr. Silverstein seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon by the PPBC and approved with two nay votes. 5 in favor 2 against 0 abstentions

Ms. Black made a motion to the School Committee that Option C3 (New School at Hillside dependant on purchase of three land parcels and swing space at DeFazio) be eliminated from further consideration. Ms. Longo Carter seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon by the School Committee and approved with one nay vote from Ms. Nicols. <u>6</u> in favor <u>1</u> against <u>0</u> abstentions

Ms. Black made a motion to the PPBC that Option C3 (New School at Hillside dependant on purchase of three land parcels and swing space at DeFazio) be eliminated from further consideration. Mr. Silverstein seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon by the PPBC and approved with two abstentions by Mr. Schifilliti and Mr. Schneider. 5 in favor 0 against 2 abstentions

Ms. Black made a motion to the School Committee that E2A & H3 (6^{th} Grade School at DeFazio and renovated High Rock as K-5 School) be eliminated from further consideration. Mr. Greis seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon by the School Committee and approved unanimously. <u>7</u> in favor <u>0</u> against <u>0</u> abstentions

Ms. Black made a motion to the PPBC that E2A & H3 (6^{th} Grade School at DeFazio and renovated High Rock as K-5 School) be eliminated from further consideration. Ms. Espada seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon by the PPBC and approved unanimously. <u>7</u> in favor <u>0</u> against <u>0</u> abstentions

The PPBC will meet again on October 19th and the School Committee on October 20th. It is expected that votes for the final recommendation of a preferred site will be made at these meetings.

Following the Hillside discussion the School Committee and the PPBC separated their respective meetings to address other business in separate rooms at Broadmeadow.

B. <u>High School Cafeteria Expansion</u>

The Committee reviewed an invoice from Drummey Rosane Anderson in the amount of \$44,366.40 for services thru September 2015. The invoice was reviewed and approved by Mr. Haff. Mr. Kent made a motion that the Committee approve the invoice for payment. Mr. Schifilliti seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously.

The Committee reviewed PSS #2 from Drummey Rosane Anderson in the amount of \$22,660.00 for additional design and technology services. The PSS was reviewed and approved by Mr. Haff. Mr. Kent made a motion that the Committee approve the invoice for payment. Mr. Silverstein seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously.

The pre-qualifications of the General Contractors is ongoing. Mr. Taliep will be going into Boston to DCAM to review the six companies. The sub-committee will have their recommendations for the October 19th meeting.

C. <u>Rosemary Pool</u>

The Committee reviewed an invoice from Bargmann Hendrie & Archetype in the amount of \$11,000.00 for services thru August 2015. The invoice was reviewed and approved by Mr. Haff. Mr. Kent made a motion that the Committee approve the invoice for payment. Mr. Schneider seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously.

The project will be on the agenda for the October 19th meeting. Bargmann Hendrie & Archetype gave a presentation to the Park & Recreation Commission at their September 28th meeting. The PPBC expects to have a recommendation on the preferred pool program by October 19, 2015.

D. <u>Hillside School Feasibility Study</u>

The Committee reviewed PSS #4 from Dore & Whittier Architects in the amount of \$34,050.00 for additional site survey work and wetland delineation work. The PSS was reviewed and approved by Mr. Haff. Mr. Kent made a motion that the Committee approve the invoice for payment. Mr. Silverstein seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved unanimously.

E. <u>Approval of Minutes</u>

The Committee was sent the minutes from the September 21st and September 28th PPBC meetings. Mr. Kent made a motion that the Committee approve the minutes of these two meetings. Ms. Espada seconded the motion. The motion was then voted upon and approved with one abstention.
